

PREPARE

The County of San Diego Department of Animal Services recommends that you prepare, practice, and update a disaster plan with your family, and assemble emergency supplies ahead of time. As an animal owner, you are responsible for the evacuation and sheltering of your animals in a time of a disaster, so your plan must include your animals. If you are told to evacuate, do so immediately and take your animals with you.

The following recommendations can help you prepare for a disaster and help to keep you and your animals safe.

- Develop an evacuation plan with two different evacuation routes
- Have a trailer to evacuate your livestock and ensure that the trailer is in good working condition
- Make sure that your animals are familiar with being loaded and transported
- Locate and prearrange an evacuation site for you and your livestock outside of the immediate area
- If you do not have enough trailers to transport your livestock, or may not be at home at the time, have a plan in place with a friend or neighbor who may be able to assist you.
- Create “defensible space” around your barns and corrals.

LIVESTOCK EVACUATION KIT

- At least 7 days of feed and water for each animal
- Copies of veterinary records and proof of ownership
- Photographs of animals with you in the picture
- Leather halters
- Lead ropes
- Duct tape / zip ties
- Heavy leather gloves
- Rope or lariat
- Plastic trash can with lid
- Buckets
- Fly spray and/or fly masks
- First Aid kit with a 7 day supply of medications



IDENTIFICATION


Having identification on your animals may help reunite you with your animal(s) in the event that you are separated. Identification should provide your name, home address, a phone number where you can be reached, and alternate contact information of someone outside of the disaster area. Include any safety or medical concerns, such as “allergic to alfalfa”, “will kick”, or “does not tie”. If possible, include your veterinarian’s name, location and phone number.

Suitable forms of identification for livestock include:

- Microchip*
- Tattoo
- Halter tag
- Neck collars
- Brand
- Livestock marking crayon



* A small device about the size of a grain of rice, inserted by a veterinarian. **Important:** Make sure the microchip is registered with a national pet recovery database and that your contact information is current.



PRACTICE

It can take a long time to gather your personal belongings and load your livestock. We strongly encourage you to practice your evacuation plan and make any necessary changes to your plan.



STAY INFORMED

Some of the things you can do to prepare for the unexpected, such as assembling an emergency supply kit for yourself, your family and your pets, is the same regardless of the type of emergency. However, it is important to stay informed about what might happen and know what types of emergencies are likely to affect your region.

Be prepared to adapt this information to your personal circumstances and make every effort to follow the instructions from authorities on the scene. With these simple preparations, you can be ready for the unexpected. Those who take the time to prepare themselves and their pets will likely encounter less difficulty, stress and worry. Take the time now to get yourself and your animals ready.
